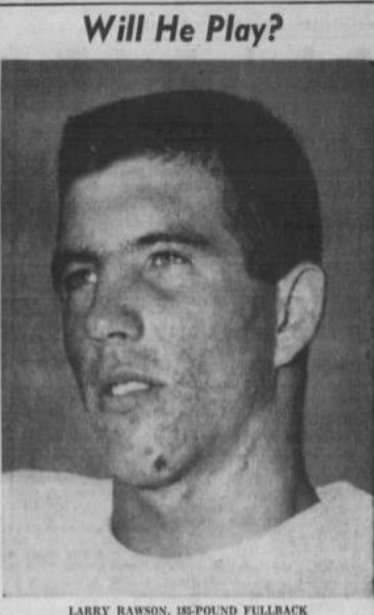

Win, lose or draw, Coach Jim Scoggins and his Pensacola High Tigers can go Blue Jay hunting against New Orleans Jesuit at Tiger Stadium Friday night with no fear of interference by a game warden.

A. R. Dye, a Tiger fan and friend of the PHS coach, has presented Scoggins and his staff with a Louisiana hunting license. It says Blue Jay hunting season opens at 8 p.m. on Nov. 14.

Enclosed with the license was a clipping from the Nov. 11 Pensacola Journal: "This is the time of year when Coach Jim Scoggins and his Pensacola High staff begin preparations for a bird hunt. The name sounds peaceful enough, but there's the meanest Blue Jay you ever heard of coming to town Friday night."

For several reasons, Coach John Kalbacher of New Orleans' Holy Cross High will be the most interested spectators at the game. Kalbacher's team meets Jesuit next week end for Louisiana's District 5 championship. Holy Cross is unbeaten but has two losses. Kalbacher is a brother-in-law of Jesuit Coach Ken Tarouti.

Kalbacher served as backfield coach at PHS after a successful tour of duty as head coach at Pensacola's Catholic High.

Jesuit will not be performing before a completely partisan crowd. Last report from New Orleans says six charter buses will bring Blue Jay fans to the Fiesta City.

Ticket windows will open at 6 p.m., with 2,000 general admission tickets ready to go on sale. PHS officials say approximately 1,500 seats are being erected in the end zones to help accommodate the record crowd.
